Council Meeting May 2, 2023, 6:00 PM

A. Called to Order

Having a quorum, the Regular Council meeting was called to order by **Council President Raymond Doherty** at 6:00 PM. **Mayor Randy Gawith** was absent. Council members present were **Councilor Rhonda Lazinka**, **Councilor Derek Turner**, **Councilor Tiffany Schademan and Councilor Vern Sandy**. Councilor Tegan Kaneaster was absent. Department Heads present were **City Recorder Teri Bacus**, **Public Works Director Tim Britain and Chief of Police William Caldera**. Corporal Daniel Badal from the Police Department also attended. Citizens that attended were **Ray Bacus**, Jimmy Doherty, and Jenn Mespelt.

F. ACTION ITEMS

F-1 Community Clean-up Day – Councilor Doherty declares a conflict of interest and recuses himself from discussion. City Recorder explains that the city has an agreement with Eastern Oregon Waste Management (EOWM). The agreement states that "EOWM will supply four 20-yard dumpsters not compacted for the annual spring cleanup at no cost to the city. She states that the spring community clean-up day is scheduled for May 12 and 13, 2023. Owner Jimmy Doherty provides a summary on how previous cleanup events were coordinated. He explains where and when the dumpster will be placed. There was discussion about thrift items at a local empty building. This event is for two days instead of previous years being only one day and Jimmy is requesting that the city provide two extra dumpsters. If they are not used, no payment will be required. City Recorder suggests that we have six dumpsters at the site and have another delivered to the building. Jimmy would like to put four and switch out as they become full. Filling the containers and compacting were discussed. **Councilor Turner made a motion to approve three extra dumpsters for community cleanup day and Councilor Lazinka seconded. Councilor Schademan voted yes, and Councilor Sandy voted yes. Motion carried: 4 Yes – 0 No**

F-2 First Reading Ordinance #597 Dangerous Dog – City Recorder presents Ordinance #597 and reads the ordinance in title only. No public comments were made. **Councilor Turner made a motion to approve the**

first reading of Dangerous Dog Ordinance #597 and Councilor Schademan seconded. Councilor Lazinka voted yes, and Councilor Sandy voted yes. Motion carried: 4 Yes – 0 No

F-3 Information Technology (IT) Agreement – Chief Caldera explains that the city has been using InterMountain ESD for IT services and they will no longer be servicing municipalities beginning July 1, 2023. He contacted Umatilla County, but they explained that they do not have the resources and are unable to provide the service. The only other option is the City of Hermiston, and he presents an agreement for IT services. The City of Hermiston is also providing services to several other municipalities in eastern Oregon including the City of Pendleton. The cost is significantly more but there are no other options. The agreement is for three years with two optional three-year renewal options. The cost is \$960 monthly which is \$11,520.00annually but they do have the certifications needed to work on the Police Departments computers. The cost and the services offered were discussed. **Councilor Turner made a motion to approve the IT agreement with the City of Hermiston and Councilor Sandy seconded. Councilor Lazinka voted yes, and Councilor Schademan voted yes. Motion Carried: 4 Yes – 0 No**

F-4 Award Bid for Cherry Street Paving Project – Public Works Director explains that request for bids were sent out and three bids were received for the Cherry Street paving project. The bid received from Central Washington Asphalt was considerably lower and it was discovered that they had miscalculated measurements. Therefore, a letter was sent to them explaining that their bid had been rejected. The other two bids were from American Rock in the amount of \$220,675.00 and Granite which was \$254,000.00. He is recommending that American Rock should be awarded the bid due to their bid being lower. City Recorder explains that the city applied for a grant through the Small City Allotment program and was approved. The Oregon Department of Transportation will be awarding the city \$250,000 specifically for this project. Details of the paving and the amount of time it will take were discussed. Councilor Sandy made a motion to approve awarding the bid to American Rock and Councilor Turner seconded. Councilor Schademan voted yes, and Councilor Lazinka voted yes. Motion carried: 4 – Yes 0 – No

G-1 Department Head Report – Chief Caldera discusses selling the old police vehicles and the process involved. Councilor Doherty asks about the 80 foot right of way at the industrial property. The Public Works Director explains that the survey has been completed. City Recorder discussed the budget committee date and time.
